**GENERAL ORDER 22-09**

The United States Senate and House of Representatives have passed, and the President has signed, the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (also known as the CARES Act). Section 15002 of the CARES Act provides for video teleconferencing or telephone conferencing of certain criminal proceedings in the federal district courts. Such video teleconferencing may be authorized upon a finding by the Judicial Conference of the United States that emergency conditions due to the national emergency, which was previously declared by the President due to COVID-19, will materially affect the function of the federal courts generally or the function of a particular district court. Upon such a finding by the Judicial Conference, the chief judge of a district court, upon application of the Attorney General or his designee or on motion of the judge, may authorize the use of video teleconferencing, or telephone conferencing if video teleconferencing is not reasonably available, for specific events in criminal cases.

On March 29, 2020, the Judicial Conference found, pursuant to the CARES Act, that emergency conditions due to the national emergency declared by the President under the National Emergencies Act (50 U.S.C. § 1601 et seq.) with respect to COVID-19 have materially affected and will materially affect the functioning of the federal courts generally.

On December 16, 2021 the Court entered General Order 21-38 extending the authorization of video teleconferencing or teleconferencing of certain criminal proceedings for 90 days from December 17, 2021.

Accordingly, effective the 16th day of March 2022, pursuant to Section 15002 of the CARES Act and in light of the public health concerns described in General Order 22-07, the Judges of this Court hereby enter the following findings and orders:


The following proceedings may be conducted by video teleconferencing, or by telephone conferencing in the event that video teleconferencing is not reasonably available:

- (A) Detention hearings under section 3142 of title 18, United States Code;
- (B) Initial appearances under Rule 5 of the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure;
- (C) Preliminary hearings under Rule 5.1 of the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure;
- (D) Waivers of indictment under Rule 7(b) of the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure;
- (E) Arraignments under Rule 10 of the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure;
- (F) Probation and supervised release revocation proceedings under Rule 32.1 of the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure;
- (G) Pretrial release revocation proceedings under section 3148 of title 18, United States Code;
- (H) Appearances under Rule 40 of the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure;
- (I) Misdemeanor pleas and sentencings as described in Rule 43(b)(2) of the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure; and
- (J) Proceedings under chapter 403 of title 18, United States Code (commonly known as the Federal Juvenile Delinquency Act), except for contested transfer hearings and juvenile delinquency adjudication or trial proceedings;
- (K) Felony pleas under Rule 11 of the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure;
- (L) Felony sentencings under Rule 32 of the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure;
- (M) Plea and sentencing or disposition proceedings under chapter 403 of title 18 of the United States Code.


Video teleconferencing or telephone conferencing authorized under this general order may only take place with the consent of the defendant, or the juvenile, after consultation with counsel.

Pursuant to Section 15002(b)(3) of the legislation, this authorization will remain in effect for 90 days unless terminated earlier. If emergency conditions continue to exist 90 days from the entry of this order, the Court will review this authorization and determine whether to extend it. This order supersedes general order 21-38.




